

Irish Genealogical Research Society Dr P Smythe-Wood's Irish Newspaper Index Irish Prison Officers & their families

The late Dr Patrick Smythe-Wood presented a large collection of card indexes to the IGRS Library, reflecting his various interests, - the Irish in Canada, Ulster families, Prison Officers etc. These include abstracts from various Irish Newspapers, mainly Ulster, including the Belfast Newsletter. Abstracts are included for all papers, excluding any entries in the Belfast Newsletter prior to 1801, as these are fully available online. Dr Smythe-Wood often found entries in several newspapers for the one event, & these will be shown as one entry below. In most cases, Dr Smythe-Wood has recorded the exact entry, but in some, marked thus *, the entries were adjusted into a database, so should be treated with more caution. There are further large card indexes prepared by Dr Smythe-Wood, of Miscellaneous notes on families which are not at present being digitised, but which often deal with the same families treated below.

In addition to the newspaper extracts shown below, Dr Smythe-Wood also noted instances of prison officers from a variety of other sources, such Succession Lists, Burke's Landed Gentry, Gravestone Inscriptions, Prison Officers abroad etc, & these are held at the IGRS Library. Newspaper extracts dealing with prison Officers in the 20th century are also at the Library. He also included prison officers as listed in various directories and, as the directories (listed below) are generally available, these index cards have joined the cards listing newspaper extracts in long-term storage. ADAMS: [BNL, Wed 10 Nov 1858] November 5 at the Bridewell of Magherafelt, Bella, daughter of Mr John Adams, Bridewell Keeper, aged 8 years. [BNL, 20 Apr 1859] April 12, at 158 Hill Street, Garnethill, Glasgow, by the Rev Robert Gault, Mr James Gilmour to Mary Jane, eldest daughter of Mr John Adams, Bridewell Keeper of Magherafelt, County Derry.

ADAMS: [BNL, 5 Mar 1833] In November last at New Orleans, shortly after his arrival, Mr Samuel Adams, late Governor of the Gaol in Derry.

ALLISON: [ARG, 13 May 1853, & BNL 9 May 1853] May 5 in Bessborough Terrace, Dublin, Edward Allison Esq, late Governor of Kilmainham Jail, after a long & painful illness, aged 76 years.

ALLISON: [BNL, 19 Oct 1861] October 17 at his residence, Kilmainham, Robt Allison Esq, many years Governor of Kilmainham Jail, aged 56 years.

ALSTON: see LONG

ARCHER: [BCC, 27 May 1826] May 18 at Clashmore, in the county of Waterford, in the 68th year of his age, the Rev Foster Archer, some time since Inspector-General of Prisons in Ireland. On the morning of the preceeding day, whilst rising from prayers, he was seized with an apoplectic fit, and though two physicians were in immediate attendance, he expired within 20 hours afterwards. [ECE, 25 May 1826] *shorter notice.*

ARMSTRONG: see KINAHAN

ARMSTRONG: [BNL, 15 Mar 1852] March 11, Mrs Armstrong, wife of Mr John Armstrong, Deputy Governor of Armagh Gaol.

ARMSTRONG: [BMO, 26 Jan 1861] At Ardee, Mr Wm Armstrong, aged 64 years, for upwards of 20 years Bridewell Keeper at Ardee.

BARTON: [NEN, 14 Jan 1871] On the 10th inst, at Monkstown Church, by the Rev James Disney, AM, Rector of Killyman, John Barton, late Captain HM 14th Regiment, Director of Government Prisons, second son of John Barton Esq, JP, of Sybil Hill, Co Dublin, to Agnes Florence, eldest daughter of Frederick Smyth Esq, late Captain, 14th Regiment, of Clarinda Park, Kingstown.

BAYNES: see MASON

BEATTY: [SLC, 27 Nov 1852*] Death: On 21st November, Mary, wife of John Beatty Esq, Governor of Sligo Prison.

BIRNIE: [BSH, 15 Dec 1843, & LST, 13 Dec 1843] On Monday, the 4th inst, in Lifford Gaol, Jane, eldest daughter of Mr John Birnie, head turnkey, aged 15 years.

BOURNES: [RLG, 7 Nov 1829] At Rathgar, county Dublin, Mr George Frederick Bournes, many years Governor of Newgate. By his death a vacancy has occurred for that situation, which is worth £1000 per annum. [ECE, 5 Nov 1829, & LJL, 10 Nov 1829] November 1st, Frederick George Bournes Esq, Governor of the Jail of Newgate, Dublin. The place vacated by the death of this highly esteemed individual will, we have reason to believe, be filled by John Smyth, brother of Alderman Smyth. The election is on the corporation. [BNL, 23 Mar 1863] March 20 at Charlemont Street, Dublin, Margaret Elizabeth, eldest daughter of the late Captain Bournes, Governor of Newgate.

BOYD: [BNL, 18 Nov 1859, BMO, 26 Nov 1859, & TYC, 25 Nov 1859] November 17, in the First Presbyterian Church, Coleraine, by the Rev W Richey, assisted by the Rev J Denham, DD, Londonderry, Richard Boyd Esq, Lieut half-pay, Governor County Derry Prison, to Elizabeth, second daughter of the late Alexander Neill Esq, Surgeon, Royal Navy.

BRADY: see SHARKEY

BROWN: [LST, 8 Dec 1848] On the 24th ult in Clogher, in the 18th year of her age, Rebecca, second daughter of Mr John Brown, Bridewell Keeper, & on the 25th Rebecca, his wife, aged 55, both of fever. [TYC, 3 Aug 1849] At Clogher Cathedral, on the 26th of July, Mr John Brown, Bridewell Keeper, to Miss Ellen Dumion [?] of Ballynagowan.

BROWN: [ARG, 22 Dec 1846] On the 15th inst, in Armagh Jail, Mr William Brown, turnkey, aged 31 yrs.

BULKELEY: [NEN, 31 Jan 1874] At Maryborough, the wife of Arthur C Bulkeley Esq, Governor of Queen's County Prison. [NEN, 24 Jul 1880] July 19th at HM Prison, Maryborough, the wife of A C Bulkeley Esq, of a daughter. [NEN, 25 Jun 1887] June 21st at the Governor's House, HM Prison, Maryborough, to the wife of A Cashel Bulkeley Esq, of a daughter.

BUNTING: see ROBINSON

CAMPBELL: [BNL, Thu 26 Feb 1863] At his residence, Carnlough, County Antrim, Alexander Campbell, late Governor of Tyrone County Jail, aged 60 years. His remains will arrive at Armagh Railway Station at 2.30 pm on tomorrow (Fri) for interment in Drumragh Burial Ground. [TYC, 27 Feb 1863] *as previous entry, with date of death given as February 24th.*

CANE: [NST, 19 Mar 1853] Robert Cane Esq, MD, has been appointed physician to the Kilkenny county jail, in the room of Joseph Lalor, Esq, MD, resigned.

CANNON: [NEN, 11 Nov 1874] November 6th at Navan, in the 81st year of his age, P C Cannon Esq, Local Inspector, Naas Gaol, formerly Clonmel.

CAREY: [CCH, 10 Jun 1854, & BNL, Mon 12 Jun 1854] At the residence of her father, on the 3rd inst, after a few weeks' illness of consumption, Ann Eliza, aged 19 years, the second beloved daughter of Mr Carey, keeper of the Coleraine Bridewell, & late Colour Sergeant, Royal Sappers and Miners.

CARR: [BMO, 10 Jan 1863, & NSM, 10 Jan 1863] January 1 at Portrush, Mr Henry Carr, late of the Queen's Prison, London, aged 61 years.

CLARKE: [BNL, 6 Oct 1860] Oct 4 at 16 Richmond, Fairview, Wm Clarke Esq, for many years Governor of Naas County Prison, aged 66 years.

COLTON: see MAGEE

COOKE: [CCH, 8 May 1897] At First Derry Presbyterian Church, on the 30th ult, by Rev J Cargue, William T Cooke, HM Prisons Service, to Kate, youngest daughter of the late Joseph Kyle, Limavady.

COOPER: [TYC, 19 Oct 1888] October 16th at the Court House, Lifford, William Cooper, aged 70 years. Court Keeper for 16 years.

CORNELIUS: [NSM, 13 Aug 1842] On Friday night the 5th inst, Mr Samuel Cornelius, Bridewell Keeper & Clerk to the Cootehill Poor Guardians. [*Description of his sudden death follows*].

COTTINGHAM: [BNL, 25 Feb 1852] Feb 22nd of consumption, Fanny Hamilton, the beloved wife of Robert H Tritton, and daughter of the late Major Cottingham, Inspector-General of Prisons. [CAS, 21 Jun 1862] June 17 at Monkstown Church, Alexander Edward, third surviving son of the late Rev Alexander M'Clintock, Rector of Newtownbarry & Clonegal, Co Wexford, to Mary Selina, youngest daughter of the late Major Cottingham, Inspector-General of Prisons in Ireland. [NEN, 17 May 1865] At Kingstown, Emily Rose, daughter of the late Major Cottingham, Inspector-General of Prisons in Ireland.

COUGHLAN: [NEN, 17 Aug 1864] After a short illness, at Portumna on Sunday evening, Mr Thomas Coughlan, Bridewell Keeper. The deceased was a resident of the town for nearly 30 years as Police Sergeant & Bridewell Keeper and had, by his consistent work, earned for himself the respect of all who knew him. He leaves behind him a large and interesting family to mourn the loss of an affectionate husband and father.

COULTER: [DOR, 30 Apr 1898] April 21, at 17 Brookvale Avenue, Belfast, Robert Coulter, ex-Governor of Kilmainham Prison, Dublin.

CRAIG: [BNO, 22 Nov 1862, & NSM, 22 Nov 1862] November 13 at Newtownlimavady, Mr Alex. Craig, bridewell keeper.

CREANE: [NEN, 8 Aug 1863] In London, Martin J Creane, MD, son of the Governor of Co Kerry Gaol, to Lizzie, daughter of the late J Franks Esq, Liverton, Lancashire.

CROGHAN: [NEN, 23 Feb 1878] On the 10th inst, Edward H Croghan, second son of Edward Croghan Esq, Governor of Carlow Jail, to Margaret Beaumont, eldest daughter of Matthew Smyth Esq, of Kilkenny.

CUNNINGHAM: [NEN, 17 Mar 1866] On Wednesday last, John Cunningham, the warder belonging to Nenagh Gaol, who was arrested on Sunday under the Habeas Corpus Act, was removed to Dublin in charge of a party of police, under command of Constable Moore.

DAVIDSON: see WATERWORTH

DAVIS: [RWC, Tue 9 to Fri 12 Jan 1776] Last Tuesday died, in Patrick Street, the wife of Mr John Davis, City Gaoler.

DAVIS: [BNL, 20 Jan 1835, & ECE, 15 Jan 1835] On Saturday 10th inst, Sergeant John Davis, formerly of the Fermanagh Militia & Principal turnkey in the gaol of Enniskillen.

DAWSON: [SNL, 26 Dec 1798] W H Dawson, Keeper of the Sheriff's Prison, acknowledges to have received from J Harrison Esq, one guinea for the poor confined debtors therein, for which they return sincere thanks.

DEVLIN: [LST, 2 Apr 1857] At Bennett's Lane, on the 26th ult, Jane, the beloved wife of Mr John Devlin, turnkey in Londonderry Gaol, aged 34 years.

DILLON: [FRJ, 13 May 1773] Death: at Kilmainham, Mr Dillon, jailer of that place.

DISNEY: [TYC, 10 Feb 1882] On Tuesday February 7th, Captain Lambert R Disney, Governor of HM Prison, Omagh, of typhoid fever, after a short illness, aged 40. Cortege will leave this day (Friday) at 10am for Drumnagh[?].

DIXON: see ROWLAND

DONALLY: [LST, 24 Sep 1847, & ARG, 21 Sep 1847] At Spike Island, Cove, on Monday week, after a very brief illness, Mr John Donally, Deputy Governor of the island, and late deputy Governor of the gaol of Armagh, aged 32. [TYC, 17 Sep 1847] *similar, with eulogy, adding: 3 weeks since his promotion to the situation from which he has been so suddenly removed.*

DOWNES: [TYC, 4 Mar 1853] On the 24th ult, in Queenstown Church, by the Rev Mr Bouchier, Charles Kendall Esq of Dundalk, to Margaret Amelia, eldest daughter of George S Downs Esq, Deputy Governor of Spike Island.

DUGGAN: see MORROW

DUMION: see BROWN

DUNN: [BCC, 13 Feb 1826, & ECE, 16 Feb 1826] In St Peter's Church, Dublin, on the 2nd instant, by the Rev Mr Hobson, George Dunn Esq, Governor of Kilmainham Gaol to Miss Mary Osburn Stoyte of Rathmines. [BNL, 3 Dec 1841] On the 25th ult, after a very severe and lingering illness, George Dunn Esq, Governor of Kilmainham Prison, County Dublin. For nearly 40 years the deceased filled his arduous and responsible office. [GAV, 4 Dec 1841] George Dunne Esq, Governor of Kilmainham gaol, much and deservedly regretted.

DUNNE: [NEN, 28 Jul 1888] June 13th at Detroit, USA, H P Higginson Whyte-Melville of that State to Mary Charclitee[sic], eldest daughter of J J Dunne Esq, late Governor of Nenagh Prison, Ireland. [NEN, 6 Nov 1889] October 8th at Cape Colony, George Everett Murray, MB, to Kathleen, second daughter of Captain J J Dunne, late Governor of Nenagh Prison. [TYC, 4 Sep 1891] August 13th at Bundoran, by the Rev F Naylor, Captain J J Dunne, late 49th & 1st Worcester Regiment, and HM's Prison Service, to Sara Charlton (née Mathews), widow of George Pearson Esq, Surgeon, 7th Hussars.

EAGER: [NEN, 22 Dec 1866] On the 18th inst, the wife of Francis M G Eagar Esq, Governor of Limerick Gaol, of a son.

ECHLIN: [BNL, Sat 20 Nov 1858, & BMO, 27 Nov 1858] November 17th at Downpatrick, the wife of G L Echlin, Esq, Governor of Down Jail, of a son.

EDWARDES: [NEN, 14 Jun 1871] On 6th June, William Lindsay to Emily Agnes, only daughter of Major Hume Edwardes, late 55th Regt, & formerly Governor of the Military Prison, Limerick.

ELLIS: [TYC, Thu 11 Aug 1853] In Castlebar, on the night of Sunday last, aged 74 years, Mr Thomas Ellis, for many years, deputy Governor of Mayo prison, & for the faithful discharge of the duties of that office, he was accorded a handsome yearly stipend when retiring into private life.

EXHAM: [RWC, Tue 26-Fri 29 Nov 1776] At Cork, Mr Michael Exham, keeper of the city gaol.

FAIRLEY: [BNL, 9 Jul 1858] July 7 at 9 Grenville St, Mountjoy Square, Dublin, Mr William Fairley, late Mountjoy Government Prison, aged 72 years.

FEATHERSTONE: [NEN, 23 Nov 1867] Mr Featherstone was appointed Governor of the King's County Gaol at the last meeting of the Board of Superintendence in the room of Captain Winthrop resigned.

FEE: see KING

FENTON: [BSH, 6 Jan 1843] On the 30th ult, by the Rev John Porter Gowdy, Robert Henderson Esq, of Strabane, to Maria, third daughter of Mr William Fenton, Governor of Lifford Gaol. [CCH, Fri 24 Dec 1847, & LST, 31 Dec 1847] At Valparaiso, on the 7th day of August last, Mr William John Fenton, son of Mr William Fenton, Governor of Lifford Gaol, aged 20 years. [ARG, 21 Dec 1847] *similar notice, but gives age as 22 years.*

FETHERSTONHAUGH: [NEN, 14 Jan 1874] On the 10th inst, at Tullamore, the wife of Captain H Fetherstonhaugh, Governor of the King's County Prison, of a son.

FITZPATRICK: [HFB, Jul 1786] Sir Jeremy Fitzpatrick, Knight, to be Inspector-General of Prisons in Ireland.

FITZSIMON: [BNL, Sat 11 Aug 1849] Sir Nicholas Fitzsimon, Inspector-General of Prisons & formerly Member for the King's County, expired at his seat, Branghall Castle, on the 31st July, after an illness of eight days, most deeply & universally regretted by all classes.

FITZSIMONS: [MAC, 3 Nov 1828] [death] Maria, daughter of Mr Fitzsimons, Governor of Galway Gaol. [BSH, 7 Feb 1840] At Galway, John Robert Fitzsimons Esq, Governor of the county Galway gaol.. [MAC, 24 Feb 1846 – recte 1840?] John Fitzsimons Esq, of Barrowe, County Galway, a gentleman who for 35 years held the situation of Governor of the County Galway Prison.

FORBES: [BNL, 12 Sep 1837] On the 7th inst, by the Rev Robert Hill, Vicar of Aghalee, Mr Forbes, Governor of the House of Correction, Belfast, to Charlotte, third daughter of the late Launcelot Turtle of Aughaagallon. [NWH, 19 Jun 1845] On the 18th June, in the 34th year of her age, Charlotte Sophia, the wife of Mr Forbes, Governor of the House of Correction, Belfast.

FORD: see SHAW

FRANKS: see CREANE

GALLOGLY: [ECE, 22 Jan 1824] On Tuesday last, deservedly regretted, Mr George Gallogly, Governor of Cavan Gaol. [*short eulogy*].

GALLOGLY: [BNL, 27 Apr 1830] On the 19th inst, in the Church of Enniskillen, by the Rev Mr Cleary, Mr George Gallogly, Governor of Cavan Gaol, to Martha, eldest daughter of Mr Robert Thompson, proprietor of one of the Distilleries. [ANC, 30 Oct 1846] On the 25th inst, Mrs Gallogly, wife of Mr Gallogly, Governor of Cavan Gaol, of a daughter. [ANC, 29 Sep 1852] At Ballyconnell, on Saturday the 19th inst, Miss Jane Gallogly, only sister to George Gallogly Esq, Governor of our County Gaol. Her remains were removed on Monday morning for interment at Enniskillen.

GALLOGLY: [ECE, 25 Oct 1827] On the 9th inst, in the 29th year of her age, Mrs Wilson of Belisse, near Virginia, County Cavan, sister of Mr John Gallogly, governor of the gaol in this county. [*Listed under marriages!*] [ECE, 7 Oct 1830] At Blackrock, near Dublin, on Sunday morning, Mr Christopher Gallogly, for many years an active peace officer of the Head Police Office, Dublin, and brother of the Enniskillen Gaol [Governor?].

GALLWAY: [NEN, 17 Sep 1870] On the 13th inst, at Tralee, after a brief illness, Christopher Gallway, Governor of the County jail.

GAMBLE: [BCC, 4 Sep 1824] On Saturday week of a brain fever, in the 36th year of his age, the Rev Piers Robert Gamble, Inspector of Prisons in Dublin, most sincerely & deservedly regretted by all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. [ECE, 9 Sep 1824] *shorter notice, noting death date as 28th inst.*

GIBSON: [TYC, 4 Dec 1863] November 26th at his residence, Saul St, Downpatrick, Mr Wm Gibson, for 30 years turnkey in Down Gaol, aged 51 years.

GILMORE: [TYC, 14 Sep 1888] September 11th at Cappagh Parish Church, County Tyrone, by the Very Rev the Dean of Clonfert, Mr James Gilmore, HM Prison, Londonderry, to Miss Matilda Hutchinson, Omagh.

GILMOUR: see ADAMS

GOOD: [BNL, 16 Apr 1857] April 14 at St Michan's Church, Dublin, by the Rev James Andrews, John, eldest son of Francis Good Esq, Governor of Smithfield Government Prison, to Charlotte, youngest daughter of James Harton Esq, CE, Mahon Abbey House, County Cork. [BNL, 13 Feb 1860] February 10, of bronchitis, Anne, wife of F Good Esq, Governor of the Smithfield Government Prison.

GRUBB: [NEN, 25 Jun 1864] June 24th at Clonmel, Catherine, wife of Richard Grubb Esq, Governor of the County Gaol, aged 38 years.

GRUBB: [NEN, 1 Dec 1866] On the 26th inst, the wife of Robert Grubb Esq, Governor of Clonmel Prison, of a daughter. [NEN, 1 Apr 1868] The wife of Robert Grubb Esq, Governor of Clonmel Gaol, of a son. [NEN, 16 Dec 1868] On the 11th inst at Queenstown, where he had gone for the benefit of his health, Robert Grubb Esq, Governor of the County Prison, Clonmel, for a period of twenty years.

HARDING: [NEN, 27 Jul 1867] July 14th at Tullamore, at a ripe age, Robert Harding Esq, Governor of the County Gaol.

HARRIS: [GAV, 4 Jan 1843] At Bruff, Mr George Harris, whose faithful discharge of the duties of Bridewell Keeper elicited the approval of each Inspector-General for several years.

HARTON: see GOOD

HARVEY: [BMO, 6 Apr 1861, & BNL 3 Apr 1861] March 31 at 72 Baggot St, Dublin, Felton F Harvey, Inspector-General of Prisons in Ireland, late Captain 13th Light Dragoons, only son of the late Lionel Charles Harvey Esq, aged 35 years.

HEALEY: [NEN, 5 May 1875] April 28 at Kingstown, Co Dublin, Henry Chippendall Healey, only son of the Governor of Clare County Prison, Ennis.

HENDERSON: see FENTON

HIGGINSON: see DUNNE

HUGHES: see THORNBERRY

HUTCHINSON: see GILMORE

HYDE: [NEN, 3 Dec 1864] At Longford, Charles Hyde Esq, MD, Surgeon to the Longford Gaol & assistant to the County Infirmary.

JEFFERS: [LST, 18 Jun 1857] At Enniskillen, the wife of Mr Jeffers, Governor of the gaol, of a son.

JOHNSTON: [NSM, 6 Nov 1847] On the 27th of October, in Jubilee Place, London, aged 63, Mrs Sarah Johnston, relict of the late Surgeon Johnston of Castleblayney. Mrs Johnston formerly filled the situation of Matron in our county gaol with zeal & efficiency, & retired on a pension; she was a truly pious woman; and in all the relations of life, her conduct was most exemplary.

JOHNSTON: [ECE, 7 Jul 1831] On Thursday the 30th June, at his house in this town, aged 72, the Rev Thomas Johnston, Rector of the parish of Boho, Protsetant Chaplain & Local Inspector of the Gaol & Chaplain to the Garrison of Enniskillen. [*very long eulogy follows*].

KEARNEY: see MURRAY

KENDALL: see DOWNS

KENT: see WHITE

KEOGH: see WILLS

KEOGH: [TYC, 17 Aug 1877] August 12 at Bangor, Captain Thomas Molyneux Keogh, Governor of Antrim Jail. Deeply regretted.

KINAHAN: [NEN, 30 Nov 1892] November 20th, Sarah Anne, relict of the late Benjamin Kinahan of Mountjoy Prison, & daughter of the late John Armstrong of Kennetly.
